## What has changed since last term and what do we know?

On Monday we resume face-to-face teaching, but we should not forget that we are still dealing with a serious pandemic. However, in the past two months the landscape has shifted positively, despite all our recent distress:

- 96% of <u>all</u> the staff of the college and support services have been vaccinated, and in the education sector vaccination has been carried out very effectively
- In the general population of South Africa, those 35 and older now have access to vaccines
- The delta strain is much more transmissible, but the symptoms are not necessarily more severe
- The vaccines are proving to be highly effective against both dominant strains of COVID

## Serious citizenship

The key for the next period of time is serious citizenship. Each person must take responsibility for their own safety. At school we will provide the conditions under which boys can ensure that they are not at risk. With you, our parent community, we have to impress on our boys the need to exercise discipline and care and to help break the chain of transmission. Each boy must be challenged to take responsibility for his own safety and for those with whom he comes into contact.
